Uterine-cancer is considered to be one of the most common malignant gynecological tumors which cause a serious threat to women health. The early symptoms of uterine cancer: its entire uterus is often accompanied by many clusters of fine, granular micro calcifications (tumor) and individual grains appearance. Hence, study on extracting calcifications has important significance in diagnosis of clinical medicine. The paper develops Computer Aided Diagnostic (CAD) System that helps the physician as well as the radiologist to detect suspicious cancerous nodules to take correct decisions for the patients.

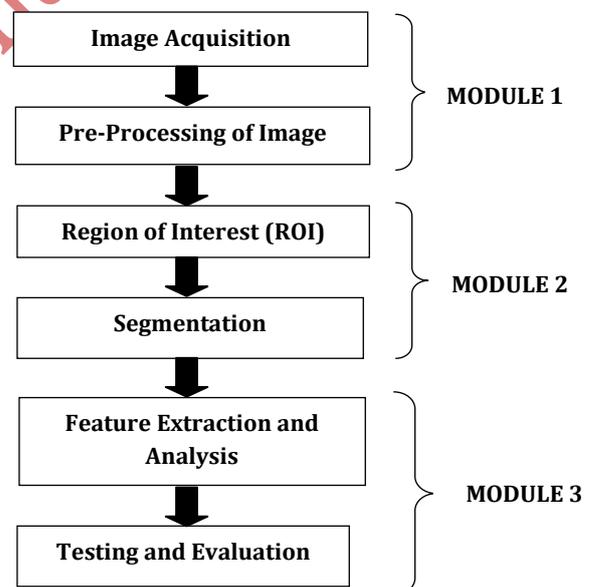

1. INTRODUCTION

The interpretation of any medical image is done by humans. The accuracy of this diagnosis depends both on the quality of image acquired and its interpretation. But there are several problems with human based diagnosis; these include perception, experience, fatigue, bias, and noise. To avoid them, computer-aided diagnosis (CAD) system has become popular. By using a CAD system, a radiologist considers the output from a computer analysis of the interpreted image, though the final diagnosis is made by the radiologist. The goal of CAD is to reduce search and interpretation errors as well as variation between and within observers. Thus, to reduce the mortality rate due to endometrial cancer, CAD systems prove to be the best tool.

2. METHODOLOGY

The projected CAD system involve following steps as shown in the Fig.1.



2.1 MODULE 1 :

2.1.1 Image Acquisition: Different images either malignant or benign are acquired from different medical atlases, pathological labs, internet websites & hospitals. The images that are acquired are completely unprocessed. The images can be in the form of DICOM, TIFF, JPG, PNG etc. All these images are converted into uint.8 format. Uint.8 is a format

where the image is converted into integer value so that further pre-processing can be carried out on it.

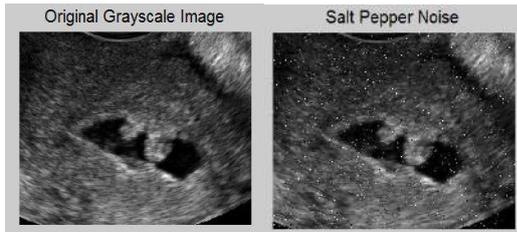


Figure 2: (2a) Original Grayscale image (2b) Image with Salt Pepper Noise

2.1.2 Image Pre-Processing: Pre-processing technique consists of Noise removal or noise suppression. Several filters are used for noise removal that is well established in gray value image processing. Few of them are Wiener Filter, Averaging Filter & Median Filter. The acquired images are filtered using wiener filter, averaging filter & median filter & are illustrated in the Figure 2: (2a to 2f)

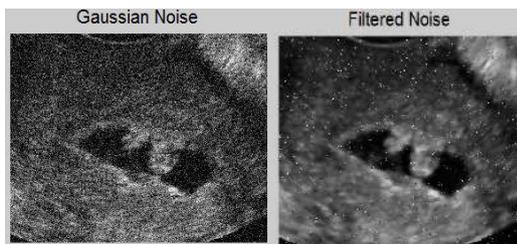


Figure 2: (2c) Image with Gaussian Noise (2d) Filtered image using wiener filter

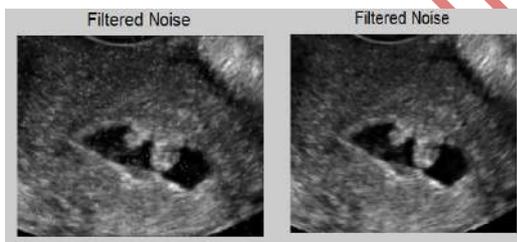


Figure 2: (2e) Filtered image using averaging filter (2f) Using median filter

 (2a) Original Grayscale image in the format of jpg is taken as input
 (2b) Salt Pepper Noise is added to the Original Image
 (2c) Gaussian Noise is added
 (2d) Wiener filter is used to remove the noise but some salt pepper noise & artifacts are still seen from the graphics
 (2e) Averaging filter is used but still some Gaussian noise & artifacts are remaining
 (2f) Finally Median filter removes all the noise, artifacts & provides better SNR as seen from the figure.

Hence, Median Filter proves to be the best that improves salt & pepper noise from the image & provides an improved quality of image.

2.2 MODULE 2 :

2.2.1 Segmentation: Image segmentation is considered to be another major step. Successful biological image analysis usually requires satisfactory segmentations to identify regions of interest as an intermediate step. Segmentation subdivides an image into its constituent regions or objects. Segmentation will stop when ROI of the object is detected. Segmentation algorithms are based on the properties of intensity values, like discontinuity and similarity [5]. Out of the several existing Image Processing Algorithms, Region Growing Segmentation approach is used here, so that only the affected ROI from the image could be considered.

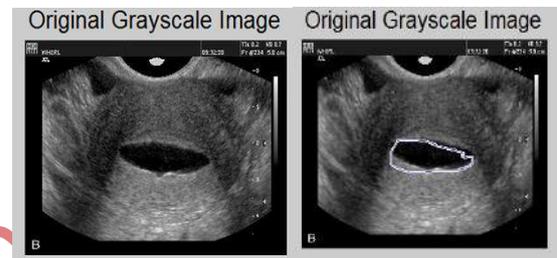


Figure 3: Segmentation of Benign Endometrium (3a) Original Grayscale image (3b) Original Grayscale image with selected ROI

The results obtained from a Benign Endometrium image are shown in the below Figure 3: (3a to 3e)

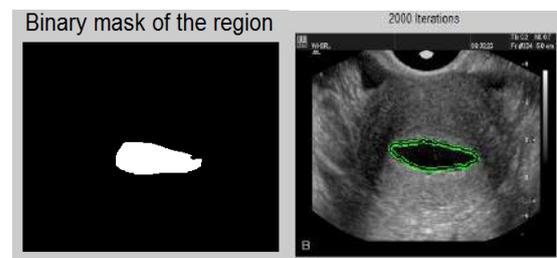


Figure 3: (3c) A 1-Bit Mask (having pixel intensity values of 1 (White) and 0 (Black) created from the selected ROI (3d) Image (ROI) after 2000 iterations

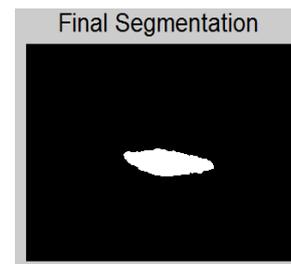
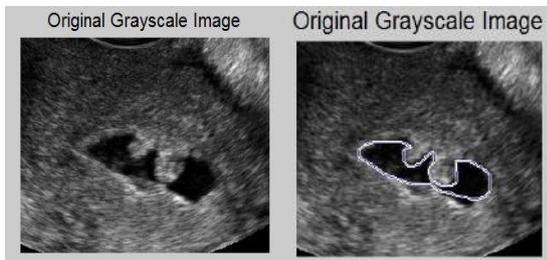


Figure 3: (3e) Final Segmented Image after 2000 iterations

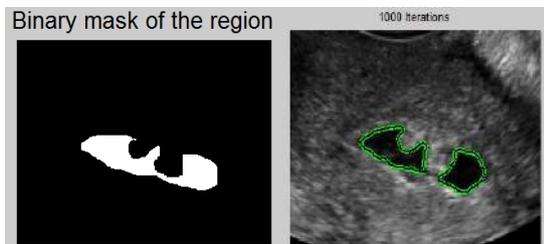

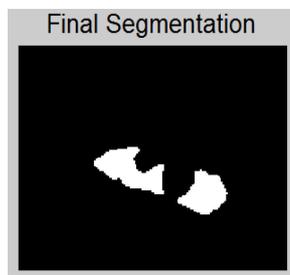
Figure 4: Segmentation of Malignant Endometrium (4a) Original Grayscale image (4b) Original Grayscale image with selected ROI

The first image obtained in Fig (3a) is the original image. Fig (3c) shows the binary conversion of the ROI. Although Image Masks can be created by manually tracing around a cell's edge, this approach is labor intensive for a single image let alone many multi-plane image stacks. Therefore for image processing, masking is usually a semi-automated endeavor. Images are first segmented on the basis of pixel Intensity; this must be done on a plane-by-plane basis for an image stack. In Metamorphism the segmented overlay planes are then extracted to a separate image stack for the purpose of creating a Binary Mask. The next Fig (3d) & (3e) shows the result after 2000 iterations.

Thus, Segmentation accuracy determines the eventual success or failure of computerized analysis procedure.

The tests carried out on acquired Benign & Malignant Uterine images. The Morphological Features such as Radius, Area, Compactness, Roundness, and Irregularity Index are extracted. The Table1 & 2 illustrate the morphological features for benign & malignant samples. Graphical illustration is shown in Chart 1 & 2.

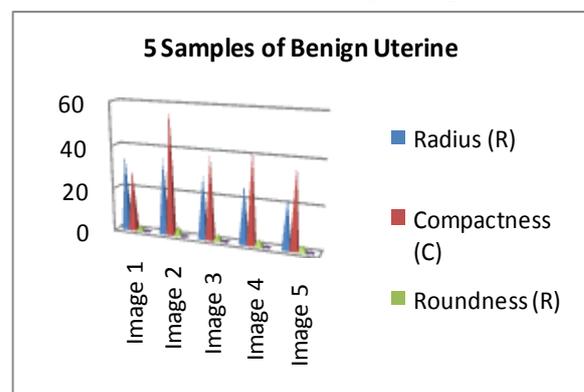
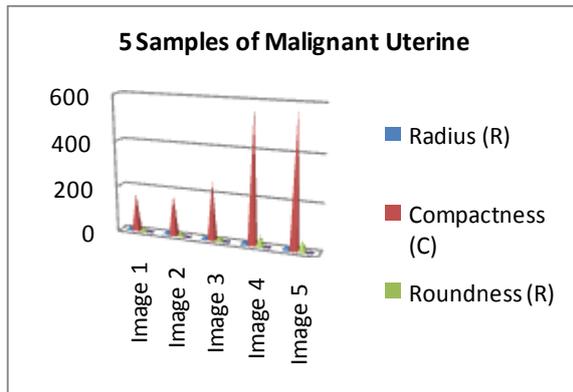


Chart 2: Bar Chart of 5 Malignant Samples

Feature extraction is a method of capturing visual content of images for indexing as well as retrieval. Feature extraction is used to denote a piece of information that is relevant for solving the computational task related to certain application system [3].

After segmentation, set of features are required for each image. In feature extraction stage every image is assigned a feature vector which is used to identify it & to distinguish the image. The features that could be extracted are morphological features, topological features & statistical features. The extracted features act as the basis for classification process.
